Getting To DEEP

On the first day of class all students are to report to the lobby of the Bahen Centre (40 St. George Street) every Monday at 08:30 for registration. The opening ceremony will start at 09:00. After the opening ceremony concludes, instructors will lead students to their classrooms. For the remainder of the week, students will go directly to their classes which will start at 09:30. The only day that students must arrive early is Monday.

For Students in Leadership Camp

Leadership camp runs from Sunday afternoon until Saturday Afternoon. Participants must arrive on campus by 12:00 on Sunday and will return to campus in the early afternoon on Saturday. Please note that students who are participating in DEEP Leadership Camp will be receiving a supplemental pre-program package.

All DEEP courses take place within the Engineering Complex at the University of Toronto St. George Campus, please refer to the maps section of this guide. The DEEP office is in the Galbraith Building located at 35 St. George Street in room 173. You are encouraged to contact the DEEP office at (416) 946-0816 or via email at outreach@ecf.utoronto.ca if you require information or have any concerns.

For those commuting to class each day, the closest subway stop is Queen's Park Station. If you are driving to DEEP, street metered parking is available for a duration of 2 hours or less on Russell Street, Huron Street and Willcocks Street. Underground parking is also available at the Bahen Centre, located at 40 St. George Street (enter off Huron Street).

DEEP Code of Conduct

Before attending DEEP, we require that you read, sign and upload to your Active account the DEEP Parental Consent & Student Code of Conduct Form.

The DEEP Code of Conduct highlights policies designed to keep everyone safe and the consequences of violating them. Violations of the code are divided into "Major" and "Minor" categories. Incidents may be categorized as either "Major" or "Minor" by DEEP staff depending on the context.

Major Offences

These offenses are considered major as they break, or attempt to break, the DEEP Code of Conduct as informed by Ontario and Federal law, the Ontario Camps Association's standards and University of Toronto policy. They include, but are not limited to:

- Abusive (physical, sexual, emotional) or violent behavior, including harassment and bullying, towards any member of the DEEP community
- Dropping or throwing objects from, at, or within residence and/or classrooms if doing so impacts the safety of others
- Sexist, racist or homophobic behavior
- Inappropriate physical contact
- Being in possession, or under the influence, of alcohol or drugs
- · Providing alcohol to underage students
- Being in possession of weapons, firearms or explosive devices
- Vandalism or destruction of property

Minor Offences

A minor offence will be judged as any violation of the DEEP Code of Conduct that does not carry a criminal charge or pose a serious safety risk. This includes, but is not limited to:

- Skipping class or any event you are registered for
- Failure to cooperate with requests or to follow instructions from DEEP staff members
- Unsanitary behavior
- Leaving a scheduled activity without permission
- Unauthorized entry into areas of the campus that have been deemed off limits
- Being out of your assigned residence room during bed check/after "lights out"
- Having a closed door with other student(s) present who are not occupants of that room
- Leaving residence without permission

Disciplinary Action

Major Offences

All major offences will result in immediate expulsion and if necessary the police will be called. Students will be asked to leave immediately and the cost of their return home will be the sole responsibility of the student and their parent/guardian. Refunds will not be issued.

First Minor Offence

The student will be issued a verbal warning and parents may be contacted. Students and parents will be cautioned that a second offence could result in expulsion.

Second Minor Offence

A meeting will be called between the student, a DEEP staff member and a representative of the Faculty of Applied Science & Engineering to determine the action to be taken. Parents will be contacted. If a solution cannot be agreed upon, the student will be expelled from DEEP and will be asked to leave the program immediately. The cost of their return home will be the sole responsibility of the student and their parent/guardian. Refunds will not be issued.

Third Minor Offence

If a student is allowed to stay after their second offence and a third offence occurs, the student will be expelled from DEEP and will be asked to leave the program immediately. The cost of their return home will be the sole responsibility of the student and their parent/guardian. Refunds will not be issued.

Residence Policies

Open Door Policy

The doors of each residence room must remain wide open at all times while residents or staff other than those who reside in that room are inside.

"Lights Out" Policy

To ensure that all program participants are well-rested, students will be asked to abide by the mandated "lights out" time each night-23:30. Students are not required to turn off the lights in their rooms, but they must keep noise to a minimum so that roommates or neighbors are able to sleep.

Smoking Policy

No one participating in DEEP is permitted to purchase tobacco products while in the program. All buildings at the University of Toronto are smoke-free. A province-wide ban prohibits smoking in all public establishments.

Attendance Policy

All students are expected to participate in and be on time for all activities. Students who do not wish to attend a particular event must get permission from a DEEP residence staff member in advance.

Sign-out Policy

Students who are over the age of 16 can be granted sign-out privileges by their parents. Those who are granted permission can sign themselves out in pairs or more, a maximum of two times during the weekdays and on Sundays. Students who wish to sign out must see the DEEP Residence Don on duty and request permission. Upon their return they must sign in with the DEEP Residence Don on duty, to let them know they have returned.

Students with sign-out permission are allowed to sign-out during weekdays after DEEP classes end and they must return to St. Hilda's by 19:00. On Sundays students may sign-out starting at 12:00 and must return by 17:00.

Visiting Family Friends and Relatives

We understand that students may have local relatives or family friends that they wish to visit while participating in DEEP. This will be allowed provided the following rules are observed:

- The Residence Life Coordinator (RLC) must receive permission, from the student's parent/guardian prior to the visit.
- The relative(s) or family friend(s) must meet the student at residence and meet one of the Dons.

Alcohol Policy

No one participating in DEEP is permitted to purchase or consume alcohol at any time. The laws of Ontario apply to all residents and the legal drinking age is 19 years old.

Guest Policy

No guests are permitted within the residence at any time without the permission of a member of the DEEP staff.

DEEP Academics

DEEP courses take a hands-on approach to exploring topics in science, technology, engineering, and math. While at DEEP you will be exposed to interesting subject matter, through lectures, discussions and debates. Students will also have the chance to solve engineering problems, design and construct a variety of projects, conduct laboratory experiments and be exposed to cutting-edge research at one of the world's finest engineering faculties.

DEEP courses are taught by some of our Faculty's top Master's and PhD candidates and recent alumni. Our instructors are passionate about teaching and are excited to share their knowledge with you. All DEEP courses run from 09:30 to 15:30, Monday to Friday, with the exception of Wednesdays, when the academic program ends at 17:00.

Students have the opportunity to enhance their DEEP experience by taking part in additional programming such as After Class Experiences(ACEs). Please note that Toronto at Night Activities and Saturday Excursions are only open to students staying in residence.

After Class Experiences (ACEs)

Every Tuesday and Thursday the ACEs program offers students the opportunity to participate in co-curricular activities. All ACEs are modeled after student clubs or research-based opportunities available at U of T. ACEs are led by current U of T students with a passion for sharing their talents and helping others develop their skills. Students will be exposed to a wide variety of experiences including listening to guest speakers, attending exclusive tours, participating in athletics and more. ACEs run from 15:45 until 17:00. Students will receive more information about ACEs at the start of each week of DEEP along with information about how to sign up

DEEP Guidelines

During lunch all students must stay within the area defined by the following intersections: Spadina & College, University & College, Spadina & Harbord and Hoskin & Queen's Park.

If you would like to purchase lunch please refer to the maps section for a number of options. You may also bring a packed lunch. Please note, however, that you will not have access to a microwave or refrigerator. We ask that program participants do not bring any nuts or nut products to DEEP for the safety of all students and staff.

Students are expected to respect DEEP staff, counselors and other participants as well as their surrounding environment, including materials, equipment, facilities and areas at the University of Toronto. Students are responsible for their personal belongings. The University of Toronto is not responsible for lost items and does not provide any insurance coverage for personal belongings.

Spending Money

We suggest that all students should have around \$100 to \$150 per week of spending money to purchase lunch or for incidentals.

Electronic Devices

Please note that the use of electronic devices is not permitted in class unless otherwise directed.

Attendance

DEEP staff will take attendance each morning and afternoon in addition to before ACEs, while on excursions and in residence. If a student is absent and we have not been informed, we will contact their parent/guardian to determine their whereabouts.

If a student knows ahead of time that they will be leaving class early or will be unable to attend class or an Ace, we ask that they bring a note signed by their parent/guardian or have their parent/guardian contact us via email at outreach@ ecf.utoronto.ca or by phone (416) 946-0816.

Students are not permitted to leave class or campus without the permission of their parent/guardian

DEEP Residence

Trinity College is one of University of Toronto's smallest, most intimate and highly regarded colleges. You will be staying at Trinity College's St. Hilda's residence.

Features of St. Hilda's Residence

Residence students will live in either a single or a double room with access to a student lounge and bathrooms along with a 24-hour reception desk (Porter's Desk). Each room comes with: a bed, desk, dresser, closet space, bedside table, chairs, linen.

Telephones

There is a phone located in each residence room for making free local calls. For long-distance calls, you can use payphones by purchasing or using your own calling card.

Internet access

Residence students will have access to the internet for the duration of the program and wireless will be accessible to all residence students upon arrival.

Residence Security

Residence Dons will be staying on the same floors as students to ensure safety and provide a support network. St. Hilda's has a porter's desk that is staffed 24 hours a day. The porters are there to monitor security and to help with any questions that arise in residence. Both Trinity College and the DEEP Team are committed to providing students with a safe environment throughout their stay.

Moving In & Out

Residence students will move into St. Hilda's the Sunday before their first week of DEEP begins. They will be required to move out the Saturday morning after their last DEEP course is complete. Students staying for more than one week will stay in residence on the bridging Saturday night between each week.

Student should arrive at St. Hilda's residence between 12:00 and 17:00 to move into residence on Sunday. If your travel arrangements do not permit you to arrive at this time, please inform the DEEP Office as soon as possible at (416) 946-0816 or outreach@ecf.utoronto.ca. Our emergency residence contact number is (647) 869-7945.

Students need to check out of residence by 10:00 on the Saturday after their last week of DEEP. Residence Dons are able to assist with arranging ground transportation back to the airport, train station or bus terminal.

Residence Information

For your stay in residence, you should bring the following:

Electronic Devices

We encourage you to bring a cell phone to residence if you have one. With respect to any electronic devices (laptops, tablets, handheld gaming devices etc.), we cannot assume responsibility for loss or damage. We ask you to use your own discretion before bringing these expensive pieces of equipment to DEEP.

Floormates & Open Door Policy

DEEP Residence has an open door policy to help foster an inclusive environment and to help keep everyone in the residence safe. If anyone other than the occupant(s) of the room is present in the room, the door must remain open. Our residence is co-ed with gender-specific washrooms and rooms.

Spending Money

While the DEEP program does offer an airport pick-up and drop-off service, please remember that transportation to and from the residence is your responsibility. Make sure you allocate enough money for your return trip!

Health Insurance

Canadian Residents

Students should bring their provincial health card and keep it with them at all times. Their health card is required to gain access to health services in Ontario.

Non-Canadian Residents

Students must purchase health insurance PRIOR to arriving in Canada. Students must bring all health insurance documents to DEEP.

By Bus

Take the bus to the downtown Toronto Coach Terminal located at 610 Bay Street. To get from the bus terminal to St. Hilda's residence, students can take a taxi. The approximate cost is \$15 and it is customary to tip the driver 10-15%.

Alternatively, students can take public transit which costs \$3.00 From the Dundas Subway station, take the subway southbound around the loop to St. George station and walk from St. George Station. Exit the station onto Bedford Road and walk down to Bloor Street. Cross the street and walk down the street (Devonshire Place) the residence is to the right, across from the Varsity Centre.

By Plane

Pearson International Airport (YYZ) is the major international airport that services southern Ontario. Billy Bishop Toronto City Airport (YTZ) is located near downtown Toronto. To get from the either airport to DEEP Residence, you have a few options:

1. DEEP Pick-up & Drop-off Service

We offer an airport pick-up and drop-off service for students staying in residence. The cost of this service is \$100 each way. Students can be picked up from the airport and taken to DEEP residence and can also be dropped off at the airport after their stay in DEEP residence has ended. The airport pick-up service is available between 12:00 and 20:00 on Sundays and the airport drop-off is available after 10:00 on Saturdays. You can register and pay for this service online through Active.

2. Taxi/Limousine

Tell the driver you are going to the University of Toronto, St. Hilda's Residence, at 44 Devonshire Place. The closest major intersection is St. George Street and Bloor Street W. The fare to campus is approximately \$65 excluding tip. It is customary to tip the driver between 10-15%.

3. Pacific Western Bus (Airport Express) To Front Street

The Airport Express is a bus service that has routes between Pearson Airport and major downtown hotels. Budget approximately \$26 for the trip one way into downtown Toronto and about \$40 round trip. Get off at the Fairmont Royal York stop (across from Union Station) and follow the directions for students arriving by train.

By Train

Take the train to Union Station, which is the main rail station in Toronto. To get from Union Station to residence, you can take a taxi or public transit.

Take the TTC from Union northbound towards Downsview station and get off at St. George station and follow the instructions in the third paragraph from the top of this page.

Residence Dining

Residence students will eat breakfast and dinner daily at St. Hilda's Dining Hall. The dining hall is all-you-can-eat with something to suit every taste! DEEP is pleased to be able to accommodate vegetarian, vegan, kosher and halal needs.

Participants are responsible for getting to the dining hall on time for meals. Any missed meals will not be reimbursed and the participant will be responsible for purchasing a separate meal.

Breakfast 7:30 - 9:00

Daily breakfasts may include selections from the following:

Lunch 12:00 - 13:00

Students are responsible for purchasing their own lunch from the dining outlets on and around campus. Participants often have lunch with their classmates and this is a great opportunity to hang out with the non-residence students in your class.

Dinner 18:00 - 20:00

Dinner may include selections from the following:

Activities and Excursions

On and off campus activities are planned nightly and may include activities such as visits to the Royal Ontario Museum, Art Gallery of Ontario, tours of Chinatown, shopping at the Eaton Centre, soccer/football, Ultimate Frisbee, movie nights, bowling, Sunday sundaes and lots more! Students should budget extra spending money for these and other activities that may be offered during the week.

There will be free time from 22:00 to 23:30 each night. This time can be used to call home, watch TV or just relax with your new friends in the common areas of residence before "lights out" at 23:30.

Friday night semi-formal event

To celebrate the end of each week of DEEP and to say goodbye to friends leaving on Saturday, we host a Friday night semi-formal event. The cost of the event is included in your residence fee. Please bring semi-formal attire.

Outings for Residence Students

DEEP residence students will participate in Saturday day trips and Wednesday evening excursions. The Saturday outings are intended for residence students who will be participating in DEEP the following week. Residence students should budget for the cost of meals and snacks during these trips.

Toronto at Night

July 9 | Waterfront Canoeing

Join fellow DEEPsters on a canoe tour of the Toronto Islands! Canoes were originally designed to carry people and goods across Canada. They are now used recreationally and to transport people throughout the many channels and lagoons of the Toronto Islands. Travel through a small paradise in Toronto's own backyard!

July 16 | CN Tower

Presiding over Toronto's majestic skyline, the iconic CN Tower is arguably one of Canada's most recognized and celebrated attractions. At a height of 553.33 meters, the CN Tower hosts over 2 million visitors annually. As the sun goes down, you'll watch as the dazzling city lights begin to sparkle. If it's a particularly clear night, we'll even be able to locate the University of Toronto. What better way to spend your Wednesday evening than on the CN Tower's glass floor 113 stories above ground!

July 23 | Blue Jays Baseball Game

Watch the Blue Jays play the LA Dodgers at the Rogers Centre (formerly known as the Skydome), North America's first stadium with a fully retractable motorized roof. You'll join up to 40,000 fans cheering on the Jays as they fight to make the MLB postseason.

July 30 | Toronto Island

Take a ferry to the Toronto Islands and explore a world of tree-filled picnic spots, marinas, old cottages and four great beaches. The Toronto Islands are made up of three major island and include exciting activities such as an amusement park, swan boats and bicycle paths!

Saturday Excursions

July 12 | Medieval Times

Medieval Times is celebrating its 29th year in North America. The founders first launched their unique idea for an 11th- century-style dinner attraction on the Spanish island of Majorca in 1973. This imaginative entertainment venue is inspired by the true medieval tradition of royal families inviting guests to a festival to feast while watching knights compete live on horseback.

July 19 | Niagara Falls Tour

Niagara Falls is considered one of the natural wonders of the world and is North America's largest waterfall. We will visit the Canadian side of the falls and will ride on the Maid of the Mist tour boat. We will also visit surrounding attractions such as Niagara on the Lake and the Whirlpool Basin in the Niagara Gorge.


July 26 | Canada's Wonderland
